Morry Cohen 1936-2003

Morry Cohen and his wife, Margo, have been major contributors to our festival from the first year at Botsford Inn in 1996. Without them and their



love and devotion to the furtherance of the arts, many non-profit organizations would be less productive. Morry's love for jazz and his willingness to match the Music Performance Trust Fund's payment to the performing musicians, assured the existence of the Michigan Jazz Festival. We didn't need his assistance every year, but he was always there for us when we needed him. (Margo is continuing the tradition and is our largest donor this year).

Morry and Margo met at Central High School drawn together by their love of music. In 1954, Morry attended Wayne State University and joined the marching band. Morry and Margo had their first date in 1956 and went to Walled Lake Casino to hear Ted Heath. They became engaged at Baker's Keyboard Lounge.

In the mid-90s, Morry and Marcus Belgrave started "Morry's Music on the Move." They brought together talented musicians who traveled throughout the Detroit area, sharing their music and joy with terminally ill patients in centers and homes.

A friend gave Morry a real estate license handbook while he was working at an automobile factory. He was fascinated by the challenge and soon passed the test to become the youngest licensed realtor in Michigan, according to Margo. He quickly moved up through the ranks and ultimately became partners with Sid Forbes. They are best known for developing Somerset Mall in Troy and Gardens of Palm Beaches.

Morry's love for music, and jazz in particular, never waned. He has helped many local musicians in so many ways. He and Margo have been major benefactors to Orchestra Hall, Detroit Opera Theatre, Michigan Jazz Festival, Ford Detroit Jazz Festival and the jazz studies program at his alma mater, Wayne State University. Their financial help has also gone to Hospices of Southeastern Michigan, Child Abuse and Neglect Council, Variety and Senior Citizens.

Margo helped us with this salute to Morry and she is positive he is hanging out with the jazz greats wherever they are playing up there in the sky. We think so too, and we miss him so very much.



Celebrating our History

In 1991 two big band leaders, John Trudell and Emil Moro, felt that many jazz festival organizers believed that only nationally celebrated artists should be invited to play. They went to the Elkhart Jazz Festival in Indiana and met with bandleader Tom Saunders who had some experience producing a festival. The Michigan Jazz Festival was about to become a reality and the first one was held at Freedom Hill in 1995. Attendance was sparse, but they dreamed on.

They knew that too many of Detroit's jazz musicians had to leave Detroit to be recognized for their talents. The late Detroit drummer J.C. Heard once said, "Local? What does that mean? Everybody has to live somewhere."

The concept of the Michigan Jazz Festival would be to showcase local talent and offer it at no charge, exposing young musicians to the music and taking it into the schools whenever possible. Musicians who were devoted to the furtherance of jazz and who were willing to play for union scale would be featured at this annual all-day event.

Later, jazz promoter Midge Ellis and Eileene Standley were asked to bring their organizational skills to the event and the festival was moved to the historic Botsford Inn and was a growing annual event for four years until the Inn was sold to Botsford Hospital. Schoolcraft College was approached about its music department becoming a co-sponsor and moving the festival there. Dr. Conway Jeffress, then Vice-President for Instruction, thought it was a wonderful idea and the festival moved to its present site.

It has been presented there since 1999 with growing success and acclaim. College bands have been showcased at the festival each year and the five to six thousand attendees are a mixed bag of young and old jazz fans.

Sponsors donate about half the funds needed to produce the festival. Friends of Michigan Jazz Festival is another source of income. The Board of Directors are all volunteers, dedicated to keeping jazz on the concert stage where it should be. Two or three fundraisers are presented each year to raise much-needed funds. The festival must pay 60% of the musicians' fees; the other 40% is paid through the Detroit Federation of Musicians, Local 5 by the recording industry's Music Performance Fund. Both Clarenceville Public Schools' Louis E. Schmidt Auditorium and Schoolcraft College make their facilities available for only actual expenses incurred in presenting fundraisers and the festival.

The annual festival is held the third Sunday in July. Parking and admission are free for the 10-1/2 hours of wonderful jazz. Schoolcraft's Food Service Department will provide a full service cafeteria in Henry's this July 18th. The five-stage event will begin at 12 noon and end at 10:30 p.m. This year is special because the festival will celebrate its tenth anniversary. STOP AND LISTEN TO JAZZ!
